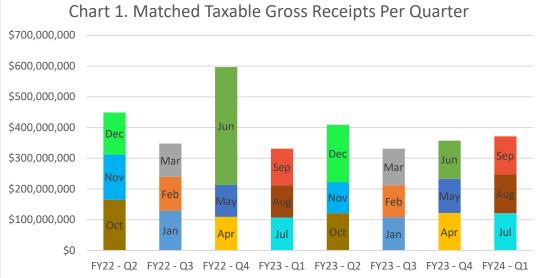

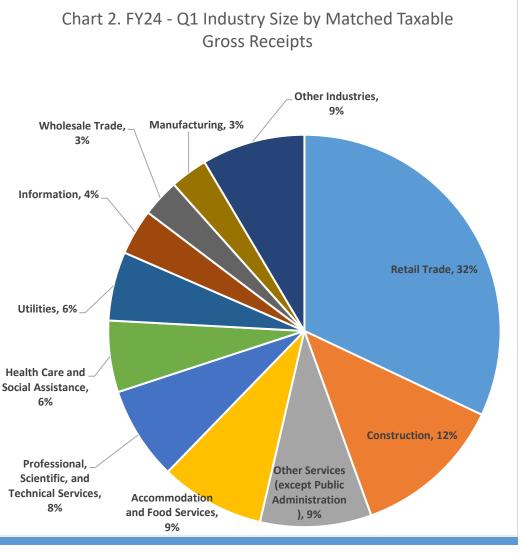

In the first quarter of FY24, 28 of 33 counties saw year-over-year economic growth, with 9.1% growth statewide in matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR). State gross receipts increased from the fourth quarter of FY23, bringing it to the highest ever quarterly total in MTGR for the state.

Otero County's matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR) increased by nearly \$14M or 3.9% from Q4 FY23 to Q1 FY24, as seen in Chart 1. The amount reported during Q1 FY24 (\$372M) was \$28M less than the eight-quarter average (\$399M). As seen in Chart 2, the largest industry as a percentage of MTGR was the retail trade industry, which accounted for 32% of the total MTGR during Q1 FY24. Last quarter, the industry accounted for 33%.

Matched Taxable Gross Receipts (MTGR) are the best tax data available to show underlying economic activity. The data collection process matches a tax payment with reported receipts for each taxpayer by industry.



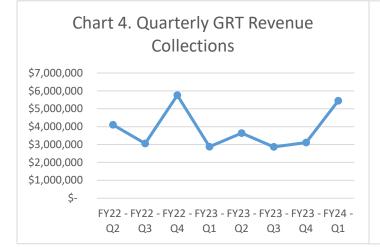

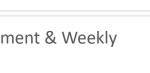
Table 1 shows that all but 4 industries reported a yearover-year (YOY) increase. The largest increase came from the professional, scientific, and technical services industry, which posted a YOY increase of \$12.4M. The largest decline came from the education services industry, which posted a YOY decrease of \$1.3M. The agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting industry, in Table 1 shows negative MTGR in Q1 FY23. This could be due to amended tax filings with TRD. The amount of quarterly gross receipts tax (GRT) collections during Q1 FY24 (\$5.4M), as seen in Chart 4, is an increase of \$2.3M or 75.2% as compared to Q4 FY23.



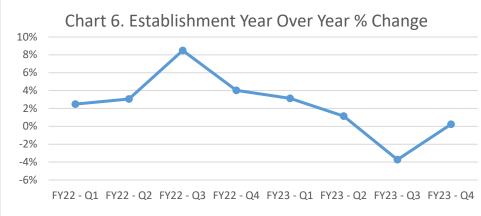

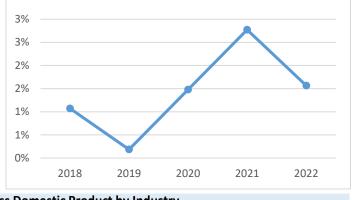






An **establishment**, as used in the QCEW and subsequently Chart 6 and Table 2, is an economic unit, such as a farm, factory, or store, which produces goods or provides services at a single physical worksite and engaged, predominantly, in one type of economic activity.

**Gross Domestic Product (GDP)** is the value of all goods and services produced in an area. The percentage that GDP grew (or shrank) from one period to another is an important indicator as to how the economy is performing. Table 2, below, shows the percentage of GDP each industry accounts for in the total GDP, in a specific county and the state. The chart also compares the county to the entire state of New Mexico, by showing the impact of specific industry sectors on the county's GDP compared to that of the whole state. Chart 7. 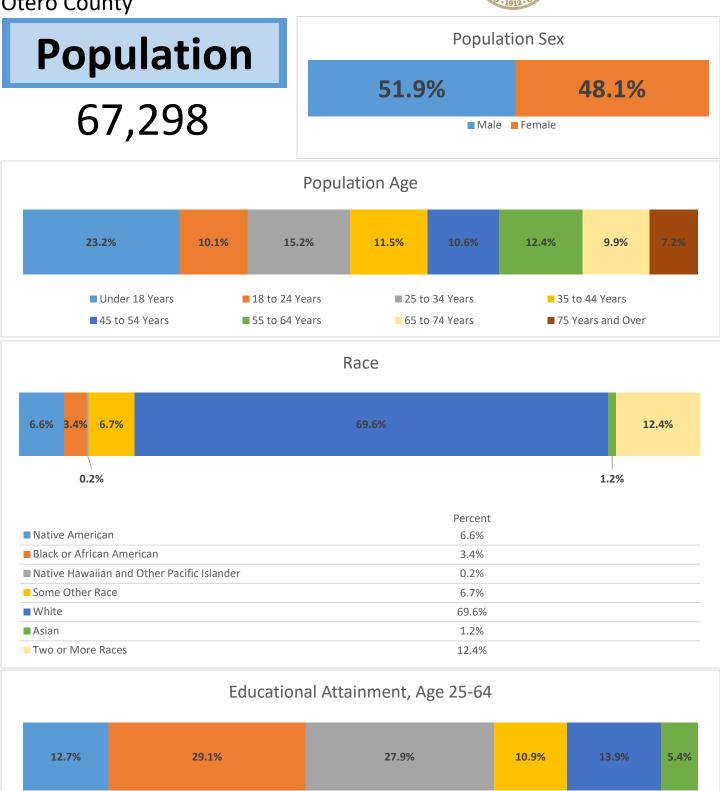
