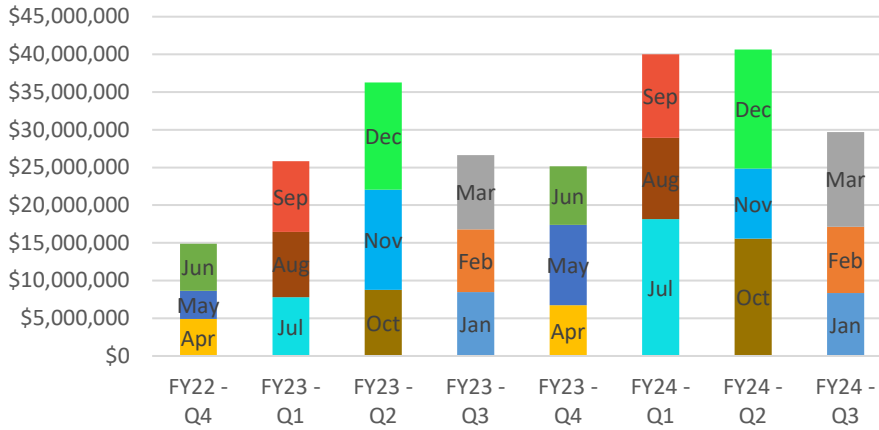

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Chart 1. Matched Taxable Gross Receipts Per Quarter

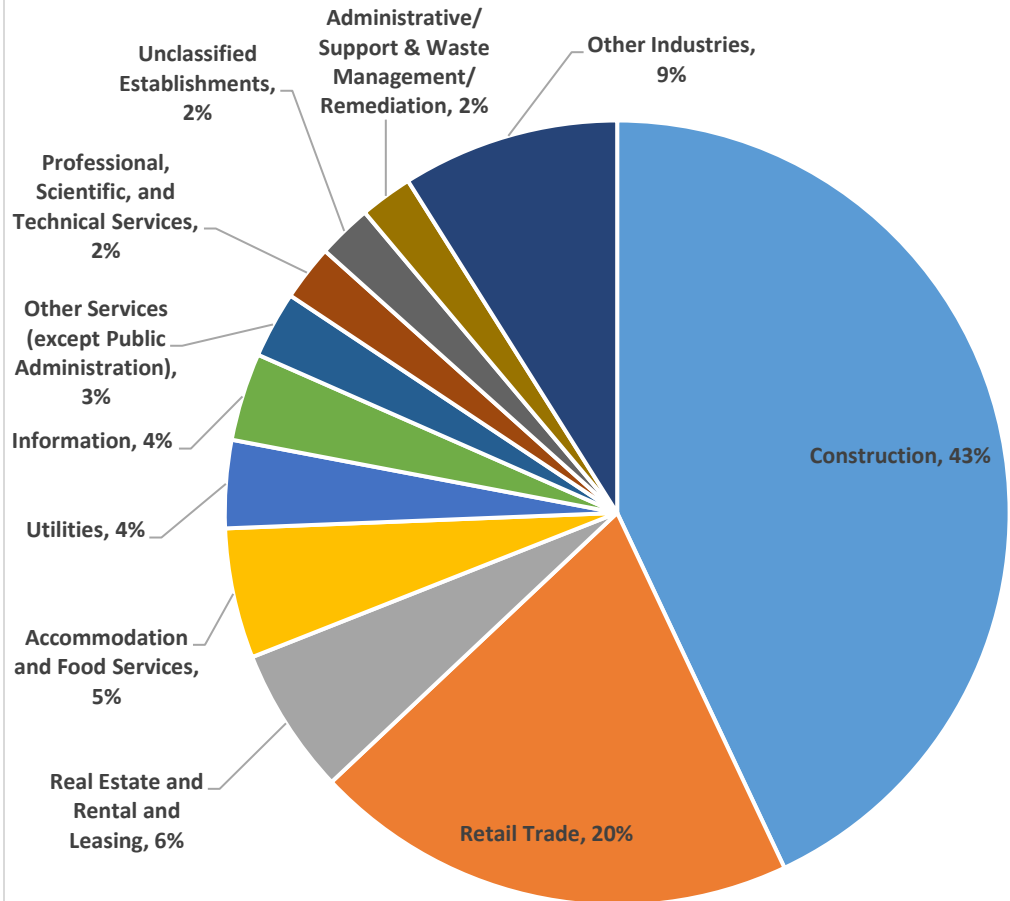

In the third quarter of FY24, 27 out of 33 counties reported positive year-over-year (YOY) economic growth, with a statewide 8.5% increase in matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR). Statewide growth was seen across most industry sectors, with construction and professional, scientific, and technical services leading. As inflation remains stubborn, employment, wages, and the number of establishments are up YOY in New Mexico.

Mora County's MTGR decreased by nearly \$11M, or 27%, from Q2 FY24 to Q3 FY24, as seen in Chart 1. The amount reported during Q3 FY24 (\$29.7M) was also \$188K smaller than the eight-quarter average of \$30M. As seen in Chart 2, the largest industry by share of MTGR was the construction industry, comprising 43% of MTGR during Q3 FY24, down from 55% in Q2 FY24. Retail trade grew from 15% in Q2 FY24 to 20% in Q3 FY24.

Matched Taxable Gross Receipts (MTGR) are the best tax data available to show underlying economic activity. The data collection process matches a tax payment with reported receipts for each taxpayer by industry.

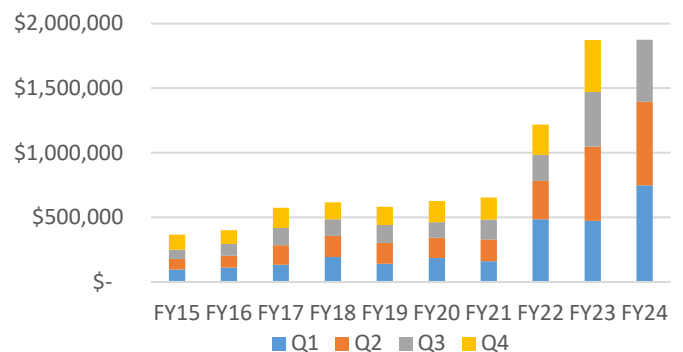

Table 1 shows that when comparing YOY MTGR, Mora County experienced a growth of 11%, or \$3.1M. The largest contribution came from the retail trade industry, which posted a YOY increase of \$2.1M. The largest decline came from the construction industry, with a YOY decrease of \$2.3M.

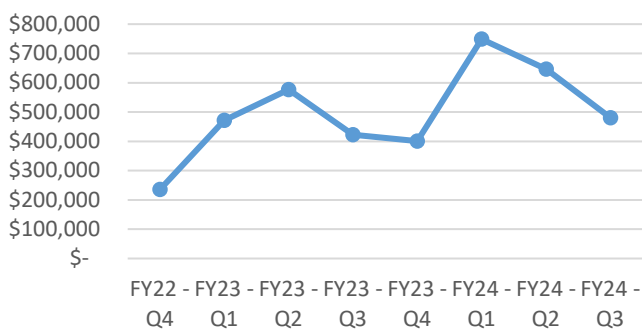
As shown in Chart 3, the upward trend in annual gross receipts tax (GRT) collections is expected to continue in FY24. Over the last eight quarters, quarterly GRT collections have averaged \$498K (Chart 4). Average employment in Q2 FY24 remained flat YOY, but average weekly wages grew by 8.2% (Chart 5).

Chart 3. Annual Total GRT Revenue Collections



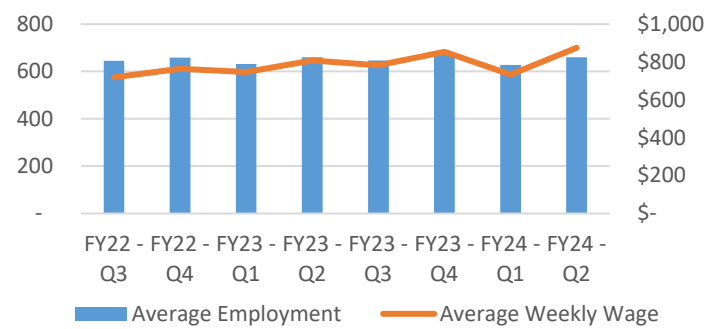

Chart 5. Total Employment & Weekly Wage



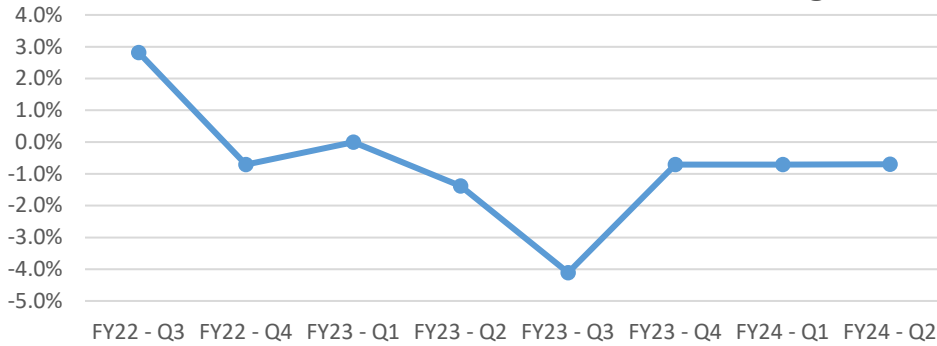

An **establishment**, as used in the QCEW and subsequently Chart 6 and Table 2, is an economic unit, such as a farm, factory, or store, which produces goods or provides services at a single physical worksite and is engaged, predominantly, in one type of economic activity.

The **Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages**, or the **QCEW**, used in Charts 5-6 and Table 2, produces comprehensive data on the number of establishments, monthly employment, and quarterly wages for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and federal workers covered by the Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE) program. These data are aggregated to many different levels, starting at the 6-digit NAICS industry level, to higher industry levels (NAICS industry groups, sectors, and supersectors), and to higher geographic levels (MSA, state, and national).

Data are based on information reported by New Mexico employers, covering 97% of nonfarm wage and salary workers. Data are published every quarter. Considered the gold standard for its reliability of industry data, the QCEW data are the most complete universe of monthly employment and quarterly wage information by detailed industry.
