
# Quarterly Economic Summary Hidalgo County



In the second quarter of FY25, 22 out of 33 counties reported positive year-over-year (YOY) economic growth compared to Q2 FY24, with a statewide 5.3% increase in matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR). Statewide growth was observed across most industry sectors, with professional, scientific, and technical services and other services leading the way. Employment, wages, and the number of establishments also increased YOY in New Mexico.

Hidalgo County's **MTGR** decreased by nearly \$6.5M, or 18%, from Q1 FY25 to Q2 FY25, as seen in Chart 1. The amount reported during Q2 FY25 (\$29.6M) was also \$2.8M lower than the eightquarter average (\$32.4M). Chart 2 shows that the largest industry as percentage of MTGR was retail trade (29%), followed by utilities (11%). quarter, construction was the largest industry (22%), followed by retail trade (21%).

Matched Taxable Gross Receipts (MTGR) provide the most accurate tax data for assessing underlying economic activity. The data collection process involves matching tax payments with reported receipts for each taxpayer by industry.




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




Table 1 shows that Hidalgo County experienced an overall 7% YOY decrease in MTGR in Q2 FY25. The construction industry saw the largest decline, with a YOY decrease of \$3.4M, while utilities experienced the largest growth, with a YOY gain of \$1.3M.

Quarterly gross receipts tax (GRT) collections during Q2 FY25 (\$318K), as seen in Chart 4, show a decrease of just over \$116K, or 26.8%, compared to Q1 FY25. In Q1 FY25, while employment declined by 3.6% YOY, average weekly wages grew by 12.9% YOY (Chart 5). The number of establishments also grew by 1.9% YOY (Chart 6 on page 3).



An **establishment**, as defined by the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) and referenced in Chart 6, is an economic unit, such as a farm, factory, or store, located at a single physical address and engaged in one type of economic activity.

The Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), used in Charts 5-6 and Table 2, produces comprehensive data on the number of establishments, monthly employment, and quarterly wages for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and federal workers covered by the Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE) program. These data are aggregated to many different levels, starting at the 6-digit NAICS industry level, to higher industry levels (NAICS industry groups, sectors, and supersectors), and to higher geographic levels (MSA, state, and national).

Data are based on information reported by New Mexico employers, covering 97% of nonfarm wage and salary workers. Data are published every quarter. Considered the gold standard for its reliability of industry data, the QCEW data are the most complete universe of monthly employment and quarterly wage information by detailed industry.
