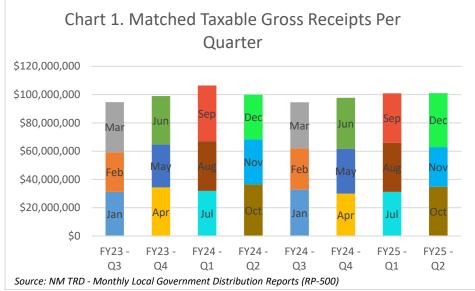
Quarterly Economic Summary Roosevelt County

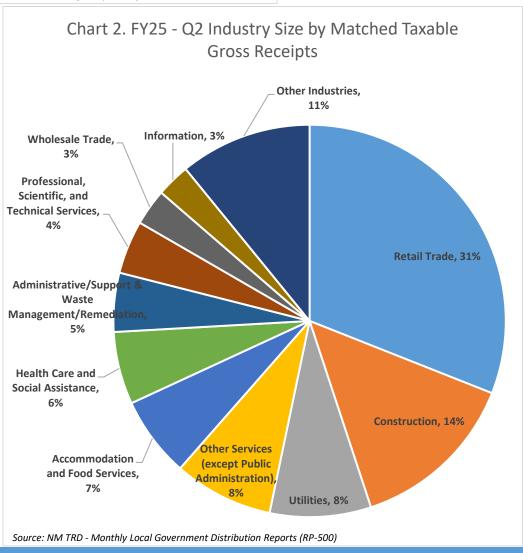

In the second quarter of FY25, 22 out of 33 counties reported positive year-over-year (YOY) economic growth compared to Q2 FY24, with a statewide 5.3% increase in matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR). Statewide growth was observed across most industry sectors, with professional, scientific, and technical services and other services leading the way. Employment, wages, and the number of establishments also increased YOY in New Mexico.

Roosevelt County's MTGR slightly increased by \$29K from Q1 FY25 to Q2 FY25, as seen in Chart 1. The amount reported during Q2 FY25 (\$101M) was \$1.7M higher the eight-quarter average (\$99.3M). Chart 2 shows that the largest industry as a percentage of MTGR was retail trade (31%), followed by construction (14%), similar to the prior quarter, when they accounted for 30% and 15% of MTGR, respectively.

Matched Taxable Gross Receipts (MTGR) provide the most accurate tax data for assessing underlying economic activity. The data collection process involves matching tax payments with reported receipts for each taxpayer by industry.



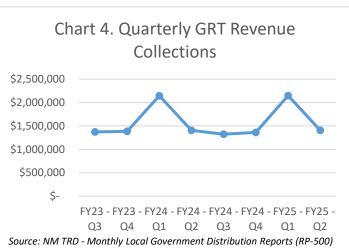
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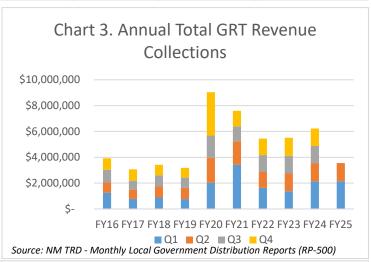


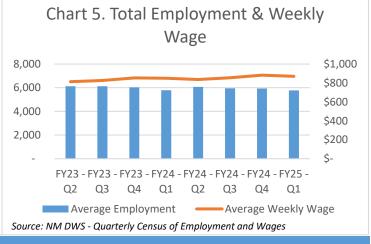

Table 1 shows that about half of the industries reported a YOY increase in MTGR. The largest increase came from health care and social assistance, with a YOY gain of \$2.6M. The largest decline came from retail trade, with a YOY decrease of \$2.1M.

Quarterly gross receipts tax (GRT) collections during Q2 FY25 (\$1.4M), as seen in Chart 4, show a decrease of \$740K, or 34.5%, compared to Q1 FY25. In Q1 FY25, while employment decreased YOY by 0.2%, average weekly wages grew by 2.4% YOY (Chart 5). The number of establishments decreased by 0.2% YOY (Chart 6 on page 3).

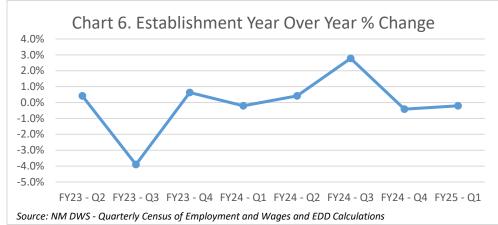

An **establishment**, as defined by the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) and referenced in Chart 6, is an economic unit, such as a farm, factory, or store, located at a single physical address and engaged in one type of economic activity.

The Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), used in Charts 5-6 and Table 2, produces comprehensive data on the number of establishments, monthly employment, and quarterly wages for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and federal workers covered by the Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE) program. These data are aggregated to many different levels, starting at the 6-digit NAICS industry level, to higher industry levels (NAICS industry groups, sectors, and supersectors), and to higher geographic levels (MSA, state, and national).

Data are based on information reported by New Mexico employers, covering 97% of nonfarm wage and salary workers. Data are published every quarter. Considered the gold standard for its reliability of industry data, the QCEW data are the most complete universe of monthly employment and quarterly wage information by detailed industry.
