


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In the third quarter of FY25, 26 out of 33 counties reported positive year-over-year (YOY) economic growth compared to Q3 FY24, with a statewide 5.9% increase in matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR). Statewide growth was observed across most industry sectors, with construction and unclassified establishments leading the way. Employment, wages, and the number of establishments also increased YOY in New Mexico in Q2 FY25.

Lincoln County's **MTGR** increased by \$80.7M, or 25.5%, from Q2 FY25 to Q3 FY25, as seen in Chart 1. The amount reported during Q3 FY25 (\$398M) was \$122M higher than the eightquarter average (\$276M), indicating an upward trend. As seen in Chart 2, the largest industry percentage of MTGR was construction (44%), followed by retail trade (14%). Last construction quarter, accounted for 34%, with retail trade comprising 19%.

Table 1 shows that 13 of the 21 industries reported a YOY increase in MTGR. The largest increase came from the construction industry, which posted a YOY gain of \$127M. The largest decline came from the accommodation and food services industry, which reported a YOY decrease of \$7.1M.


Quarterly gross receipts tax (GRT) collections during Q3 FY25 (\$1.3M), as seen in Chart 4, show an increase of \$264K, or 26.5%, compared to Q2 FY25. In Q2 FY25, while average employment decreased by 3% YOY, average weekly wages increased by 5% (Chart 5). Establishments also grew by 0.2% YOY (Chart 6).











An **establishment**, as defined by the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) and referenced in Chart 6, is an economic unit, such as a farm, factory, or store, located at a single physical address and engaged in one type of economic activity.

The Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), used in Charts 5-6 and Table 2, produces comprehensive data on the number of establishments, monthly employment, and quarterly wages for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and federal workers covered by the Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE) program. These data are aggregated to many different levels, starting at the 6-digit NAICS industry level, to higher industry levels (NAICS industry groups, sectors, and supersectors), and to higher geographic levels (MSA, state, and national).

Data are based on information reported by New Mexico employers, covering 97% of nonfarm wage and salary workers. Data are published every quarter. Considered the gold standard for its reliability of industry data, the QCEW data are the most complete universe of monthly employment and quarterly wage information by detailed industry.
