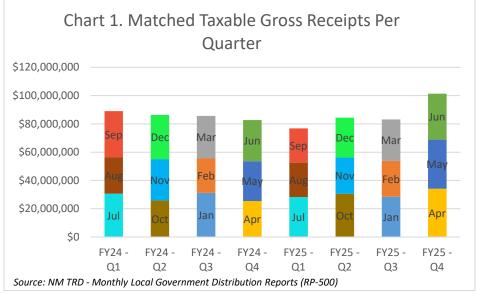
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In the fourth quarter of FY25, 24 out of 33 counties reported positive year-over-year (YOY) economic growth compared to Q4 FY24, with a statewide 6.9% increase in matched taxable gross receipts (MTGR). Growth was observed across most industry sectors, led by construction and mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction. In Q3 FY25, employment and average wages in New Mexico increased YOY, while the number of establishments declined.

Sierra County's **MTGR** increased by just over \$18.2M, or 21.9%, from Q3 FY25 to Q4 FY25, as seen in Chart 1. The amount reported during Q4 FY25 (\$101.4M) was also \$15.2M larger than the eight-quarter average (\$86.2M). As seen in Chart 2, the largest industry as a percentage of MTGR was construction, which accounted for 33% of the total MTGR during Q4 FY25. Last quarter, retail trade led with 25%, followed by construction at 20%.

Table 1 shows that 11 industries reported a YOY increase in MTGR. The largest increase came from the construction industry, which posted a YOY increase of \$11.4, leading the overall growth of 23%.

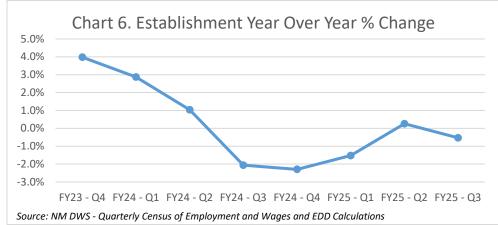
The quarterly gross receipts tax (GRT) collections during Q4 FY25 (\$1.5M), as seen in Chart 4, show an increase of 25.5%, or \$307.6K, compared to Q3 FY25. Average employment in Q3 FY25 increased by 3.3%, or 113, YOY, and average weekly wages also posted an increase of \$18, or 2.1%, YOY (Chart 5). The number of establishments, on the other hand, decreased by 0.5% YOY as shown in Chart 6 on the next page.











An **establishment**, as defined by the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) and referenced in Chart 6, is an economic unit, such as a farm, factory, or store, located at a single physical address and engaged in one type of economic activity.

The Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), used in Charts 5-6 and Table 2, produces comprehensive data on the number of establishments, monthly employment, and quarterly wages for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and federal workers covered by the Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE) program. These data are aggregated to many different levels, starting at the 6-digit NAICS industry level, to higher industry levels (NAICS industry groups, sectors, and supersectors), and to higher geographic levels (MSA, state, and national).

Data are based on information reported by New Mexico employers, covering 97% of nonfarm wage and salary workers. Data are published every quarter. Considered the gold standard for its reliability of industry data, the QCEW data are the most complete universe of monthly employment and quarterly wage information by detailed industry.
