Dear Fellow New Mexicans:

Just a few years ago, New Mexico had a reputation for punishing job creators with burdensome regulations and high taxes, pushing them away to surrounding states. OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

Introduction:

The New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) Annual Report informs our constituents, legislators and the Executive as to how and where NMEDD resources are allocated to accomplish our statutory directive to create new jobs. It is intended to provide transparency, accountability and flexibility.

Vision for New Mexico:

All New Mexicans are afforded economic opportunities.

Mission:

Enhance and leverage a competitive environment to create jobs, develop the tax base and provide incentives for business development

Business Recruitment and Expansion Highlights

New Mexico welcomed hundreds of new jobs in the second half of FY16, including the state's single largest job creation project since 2009. Safelite AutoGlass, the world's largest vehicle glass repair and replacement company, announced the addition of 900 new insurance claims processing and support jobs in Rio Rancho; Santa Fe Spirits (LEDA) announced expansion of its distillery, adding 14 jobs to its workforce; Fidelity Investments (JTIP) announced the addition of 250 jobs to its Albuquerque workforce; Wildflower International (LEDA), the largest womanowned business in New Mexico, located in Santa Fe, announced an expansion resulting in 81 new jobs; FedEx Ground and Valley Cold Storage received LEDA funds to support the construction of their new 215,000 squarefoot logistics facility and 400,000 square foot facility, respectively; and PCM (LEDA), a leading California IT company, announced its expansion to New Mexico creating 224 jobs in Rio Rancho.

The first half of FY16 saw a healthy mixture of new jobs in rural and urban New Mexico. Jal welcomed **20 high-wage jobs** with **CIG (LEDA)** announcing the construction of a state-of-the-art transloading facility; **Little Toad Creek (LEDA)** announced an expansion adding **11 new jobs** in Silver City; **Southwest Cheese (LEDA)** added **50 new high-paying jobs** in Clovis through an expansion; **Skorpios (LEDA)** began expansion adding **300 new highpaying, high-tech jobs** in Albuquerque; **New Mexico Greenhouse Holdings (LEDA)** announced the addition of 82 new jobs in Las Cruces; Rich Glo (LEDA) added 15 jobs in Roswell; Rural Sourcing, Inc. (LEDA) added 125 new well-paying, high-tech jobs in Albuquerque; Ready Roast Nut Company (LEDA) starting production, adding 200 new jobs in Portales; CyraCom (JTIP), an established company in Las Cruces providing translation services, added 100 new jobs; Sitel (JTIP) added 100 new jobs at its Las Cruces location; Solaro Energy (LEDA, JTIP) expanded its facility and announced the addition of 25 new solar manufacturing jobs in Socorro; and, Ol' Gringo (LEDA) added 10 food processing jobs in Las Cruces .

New Mexico Economic Development Corporation (New Mexico Partnership)

The New Mexico Partnership assisted with 10 locates and 1,579 jobs in FY16. The Partnership markets New Mexico as a prime location for doing business to companies and site selection consultants across the country and around the world. The Partnership's sales and marketing activities generated 75 "Potential Recruitment Opportunities" (PRO) and 27 site visits to the state.



Office of Business Advocacy (OBA)

The Office of Business Advocacy, was established as an initiative of Gov. Martinez and Secretary Barela to enable business owners to break through regulatory roadblocks and red tape. It helps to navigate state government by providing assistance with permitting, licenses, inspections, among other issues. It also resolves challenging bureaucratic, intergovernmental, and public policy problems adversely affecting business in New Mexico. The goal is to help businesses who would not otherwise be able to hire an attorney, accountant, or lobbyist to resolve their issues.

Midway through FY16 OBA lost its dedicated FTE. The department has no funding to fill this position so the Office remains without someone to market the program to the business community. This has resulted in a drastic reduction in new cases. The website for OBA remains and EDD continues to handle new cases as they are received. In FY16 OBA opened 59 cases and resolved 63.

Rural Commercial Kitchen Initiative

The second annual Kitchen Summit was held in April at the South Valley Economic Development Center. Fourteen community or kitchen representatives attended the two-day event.

Five kitchens were supported with grants in FY16. Two of the kitchens, the Taos Food Center and South Valley, served as mentors to communities considering a kitchen facility and new rural kitchens just getting started. These two kitchens received \$15,500 each for operating their facilities and training or mentoring others. The new startup kitchens are in Espanola, Ribera and El Morro and they received \$13,000 each. In addition, South Valley is working with Las Cruces, Santa Fe and downtown Albuquerque on potential kitchen projects.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

The mission of the Economic Development Division is to assist local communities and businesses in retaining and creating better jobs, resulting in thriving communities and an exemplary quality of life for all New Mexicans. Economic development is accomplished through business recruitment, expansions and startups.

New Mexico MainStreet Program (NMMS)


Utilizing the National Main Street Center's proven revitalization strategies, the MainStreet Four Point Approach®, the program is part of an economic development network of more than 43 states and 2,000 communities across the country. MainStreet's priority is always to build the capacity of its local partners to create an environment to attract new business and entrepreneurs.

MainStreet received \$500,000 in capital outlay in FY16 for economic revitalization projects and it was shared by seven communities.

- Clovis, Historic Railroad Park
- Grants, Rio San Jose Riverwalk Legacy Trail
- Los Alamos, Street Improvements on Central Avenue
- Truth or Consequences, Healing Waters Plaza
- Tucumcari, Historic Railroad District

NMMS technical assistance is delivered through a number of programs including the Frontier Communities Initiative, Arts and Cultural Districts, and the Historic Theaters Initiative.



Frontier Communities Initiative

In FY16 the Frontier Communities Initiative served seven rural villages:

Eagle Nest - Event Development. The project included planning, designing, and developing signature events to be hosted at the newly constructed "Enchanted Eagle Park" in the heart of Eagle Nest. The park has been a primary economic development project for the village over the last five years and includes new sidewalks, parking spaces, landscaping, and a pavilion. The development of signature events could help extend the tourism season by two months and stimulate additional economic growth and employment opportunities.

Mountainair - Placemaking/Design. Mountainair received landscape design and placemaking assistance to convert an empty lot adjacent to the Salinas Missions Visitor Center into a town square/park that will connect the Historic Shaffer Hotel and Salinas Missions Visitor Center to the existing commercial district. The landscape design project is the first step in a larger project to reconnect a fragmented commercial area into a cohesive and walkable space that takes advantage of the Salinas Missions Center, which draws thousands of visitors to the area each year.

Santa Clara - Façade Improvement Program. The project created façade designs for historic buildings along Bayard Street, the main commercial corridor for the Village of Santa Clara. Buildings identified for façade work are part of Santa Clara's "Historic Walking Tour" and were once vital economic drivers for the community. Business owners and local stakeholders will use the designs and training assistance to begin reviving the historic storefronts and spur additional property investment.

Santa Rosa-Adaptive Reuse/Business Plan. The

project focused on the adaptive reuse of the Ilfeld-Johnson Warehouse, a two-level 9,000-square-foot stone structure built in 1901 as a wool warehouse for the railroad. Preliminary ideas include indoor market stalls, business incubator spaces, art galleries, outdoor market, and a brewpub. The project is part of Santa Rosa's Visioning Plan to enhance existing amenities while fostering new growth and economic development.

Springer - Placemaking and Revitalization Plan. NMMS assisted the Town of Springer with the development of a viable downtown revitalization plan and potential façade improvements to help bring local businesses, stakeholders, and municipal partners together to regenerate the downtown business district.

Tularosa - Image & Branding Development. As a participating Frontier Community in FY2015, the Village of Tularosa was able to leverage technical assistance around streetscape revitalization and building renovation from New Mexico MainStreet to receive \$576,389 from NMDOT to repair and renovate the sidewalks and streetscapes of three blocks of Historic Granado Street. The current project capitalizes on these upcoming capital improvements through the development of a marketing, branding, and event design strategy to help foster economic activity throughout the entire village. **Villanueva - Entrepreneur Development.** The Village of Villanueva is part of an agricultural valley stretching 12 miles along the Pecos River. The project revolves around youth and community engagement.

Arts and Cultural Districts

The Arts & Cultural Districts program was established by the Legislature in 2007 as a comprehensive economic development strategy designed to capitalize on the expanding "creative economy." The Arts & Cultural Districts Program promotes the exceptional art and history of New Mexico while assisting communities in developing their cultural and artistic resources to create dynamic and economically vibrant districts. It is a joint effort of three state agencies: EDD, Tourism and Cultural Affairs.

Despite having never received dedicated funding, there are currently eight active Districts: Artesia, DowntownABQ, Gallup, Las Vegas, Los Alamos, Mora, Raton, and Silver City.



Historic Theaters Initiative

Nearly every town of any size has at least one theater in its downtown core. In small, rural communities these theaters often struggle to remain economically viable. The MainStreet program recognizes the importance of these theaters both architecturally and as a destination that draws residents back to the downtown commercial district, thereby supporting restaurants and other retail businesses.

The Historic Theaters Initiative provides capital outlay funding to restore the theater buildings and upgrade old technologies to today's digital format so that they can show the latest film releases.

Two theaters received funding in FY16, the Flickinger in Alamogordo and the Odeon in Tucumcari. This brings the total number of restored theaters to eight. Previously restored theaters are the Shuler in Raton; the Luna in Clayton; the El Morro in Gallup; Silco in Silver City; the Lea Theater in Lovington; and the Lyceum in Clovis.



Finance Development Team (FDT)

The Finance Development Team introduces companies to tax incentives, job training reimbursements and financial assistance programs. A customized analysis of the incentives and state programs can be provided to a business which is considering expansion, relocation or getting started in New Mexico. The FDT aids with financial packaging, accessing capital, review and interpretation of company financial statements, and in-depth financial analysis consultations concerning all aspects of doing business.

Local Economic Development Act (LEDA)

Twenty-three LEDA projects closed in FY16, totaling \$15.2 million. This amount was leveraged against total private investment in these projects of \$256.8 million, for a final ratio of 16.8 to 1. Eleven of these projects are in rural communities: Alamogordo, Clovis, Corrales, Jal, Portales, Roswell, Pena Blanca, Santa Teresa (2), Silver City, Socorro, and Tucumcari.

Technical Assistance

One objective of the Finance Team is to bring together financing tools including debt and equity financing, cash incentives and tax credits to support economic development activities that improves and support employment opportunities in New Mexico.

The Finance Development Team provided technical assistance to three companies resulting in new funding for both:

1. Taos Mesa Brewing: FDT worked with the company over the previous year to improve and focus its financial position. FDT worked with the private equity firm Luna Capital to secure bridge financing that ultimately resulted in a commercial loan from a Delaware bank.

2. Gallup Pipeline & Compliance Services, LLC: FDT staff worked with the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) through the Collateral Support Program to

assist the company with a bank participation loan through Pinnacle Bank & NMFA.

3. Carnivores Meat Processing, Chama: Owner is a multi-generational butcher, he wants to carry on the tradition and start his own meat processing shop to cater to the hunters of Northern New Mexico. He is purchasing a building compound and equipment to start the business. He has over 15 years' experience in the meat-processing industry.

Job Training Incentive Program (JTIP)

JTIP received \$7.5 million in funding for FY16 and allocated \$13.4 million (including \$4 million of the FY17 appropriation) to 60 companies, leaving a balance of \$2 million at the end of the fiscal year. If not for the emergency language attached to the FY17 Special Appropriation, JTIP would not have been able to assist companies creating new jobs between March and June 2016.

JTIP continues to target rural companies and was able to assist eight businesses in rural areas including Alamogordo, Deming, Portales, Sapello, Socorro and Taos. With the assistance of JTIP funding those companies created 119 new jobs and trained two interns at an average hourly wage of \$12.57.

Community, Business and Rural Development Team (CBRDT)

The mission of the team, commonly known as "regional representatives or reps" is to assist communities build their capacity for development by: training local leadership, engaging diverse community stakeholders in the process of planning and implementing change in their regions, and helping them identify strategic opportunities to advance the region's goals for economic growth.

There were 14 successful business development projects completed in FY16.

Region 2

Plectone is a manufacturer of guitar picks located in Albuquerque. The company was seeking international exposure and new markets. Our regional representative explained the services provided by EDD's Office of International Trade. Plectone received new orders from companies in Israel and Mexico in August resulting in increased revenue.

Taos Herb Company manufactures herbal products and was looking for programs to facilitate business growth. Our regional representative introduced the company to the Job Training Incentive Program and New Mexico tax credits they may be able to take advantage of. This resulted in the company receiving JTIP assistance at the August meeting and the creation of two new jobs.

Region 4

Old Wood, Las Vegas, is a manufacturer of wood flooring. Our regional representative organized meetings with USDA Rural Development which resulted in the company receiving a \$300,000 Value Added Producers Grant. Old Wood invested in new equipment that will add a product line for the company, resulting in new sales through Walmart. **Energy Concepts Corporation**, located in Sapello, installs solar systems and was seeking assistance to expand its workforce. Our regional representative introduced the company to JTIP resulting in funding for three new positions.

Denny's Restaurant, Las Vegas, chose the city for a new location after the regional representative contacted the corporate headquarters. Land has been secured and the new building will be funded by Denny's Corporation.

Doss Aviation, Raton, chose Raton as a result of the regional representative working with the New Mexico National Guard to transfer a vacant armory to the City of Raton which the city used to recruit the company. Doss will train Department of Defense student pilots and plans to hire five new training pilot instructors. This will result in the expansion into international student markets. The regional representative is continuing to work with Doss Aviation on short term student housing to accommodate up to 20 student pilots through local partners including the City of Raton and Grow Raton.



Tucumcari Biofuels Corporation is a start-up which will convert the former ethanol plant into a grain storage and methane gas production facility. Our regional representative assisted with getting the investors in touch with the owners of the former ethanol plant to identify potential grain storage users. Funding has been secured through a \$70,000 purchase agreement with Los Alamos Bank. A Phase One environmental assessment has been completed. Arrowhead Center completed a feasibility study and owns 2 percent of the company.

Medicus Billing and Consulting, Inc., Las Vegas, expanded to the city to increase New Mexico medical billing of physician practices. They will hire up to 15 employees at an average hourly wage of \$14.00. The company has purchased a building and anticipates utilizing JTIP.

Mora Woodworking was assisted in developing a business plan and received direction for a patent and prototype design. As a result of this assistance the company has been able to secure \$93,500 in funding including a \$30,000 Venture Accelerator Award.

Region 5

Ready Roast purchased the peanut processing plant in Portales and needed assistance with permitting, incentives and employee training. Our regional representative connected the company to OBA and all issues regarding an air quality permit were satisfactorily resolved. He also introduced the company to JTIP and they were approved for 30 new positions in September. Governor Martinez announced a LEDA commitment of \$1.5 million on September 21st.

RichGlo, Roswell, is a jewelry cleaner manufacturer that has been in business for 20 years and has acquired property for a new manufacturing facility. Our regional representative assisted the company in developing the plant layout, pro forma and business plan for a successful LEDA application.

Region 6

Samson Equipment is an equipment manufacturer in the City of Las Cruces. The city has a Wage Plus program that augments JTIP funding and the Team member assisted City staff in developing a process for making payment to a business and helped the company by collecting the JTIP documentation they needed to submit an application. Once the application was submitted the rep worked with the City's economic development office to complete the process. Samson Equipment was awarded \$1,500.00 to offset costs associated with creation of the new Plant Manager position.

Silicon Mesa, a software development company, has been operating from the Arrowhead Center at NMSU for over a year but was not aware of the Rural Software Development GRT deduction. Our regional representative provided the company with information about the deduction and how to claim it. Silicon Mesa was able to deduct revenue from software development from their taxes for prior periods and moving forward



which will help the startup company to be more profitable and competitive.

Valley Cold Storage is a produce storage and distribution facility in Santa Teresa. The company is expanding by constructing a second facility in Dona Ana County. They were awarded LEDA based on iob creation but also needed an Industrial Revenue Bond (IRB) as part of their financing plan. The county was unable to induce the IRB but our regional representative was able to work with the leadership in City of Anthony which agreed to assist with the project. Our regional representative provided City staff and elected officials with information about IRBs and assisted the City and the businesses through the process including explaining the incentive and benefits at each public hearing and working with City staff to set up accounting process. Valley Cold Storage has been approved for tax incentives for up to \$40,000,000 in investment through the IRB.

Seven economic development projects were completed in FY16:

Sandoval County Innovation Center was funded in part by a \$15,000 NMEDD LEADS grant. The Center is now fully operational with 8 interns actively engaged in entrepreneurial projects. The Center encourages high school and college-aged students to participate in entrepreneurial activities such as designing web pages, creating phone apps and computer programs that can be utilized by local business and other businesses worldwide. The concept has been embraced by Intel who has provided free space to house the center. The regional representative helped with the initial application and has been involved in the planning throughout the various stages of the project. The Center has already created a web design business, has successfully created apps which are being utilized by local businesses and are working on more. Outcome: New business, revenue and jobs.

Guadalupe County purchased the Pecos Theater in January 2016 for \$55,000. The regional representative assisted the business owner and Guadalupe County in facilitating the first site visit and further discussions that ultimately led to this new



theater investment. The theater and a new barber shop

are creating an entrepreneurial anchor in the heart of downtown.

The regional representative also drafted and presented the proposed **LEDA Outcome: New capital investment.**

Anton Chico Land Grant Economic Development Incubator Mainstreet Frontier Project was selected and has received \$75,000 in grants and services. The Regional Representative assisted the board in registering the corporation. In addition he assisted with the management strategy with the Land Grant Board, which is the landlord. The Singleton Ranch provided the matching funds, which was the largest match received to-date. The regional representative shared presentations at a town hall event and organized a business resource fair for potential commercial kitchen and rental tenants. The incubator is currently advertising to hire a manager and the Incubator intends to by fully operational by next quarter. **Outcome: New jobs, businesses and revenue.**

Greater Springer Economic Development Corporation has purchased the Sapp-designed commercial building for \$15,000. The Economic Development Corporation plans to make the property suitable for resale to a commercial business that will serve the drive through traffic from Texas, thus increasing revenue for the village. This project was included in the FY16 Frontier Program and will be rehabilitated to house retail growth. This building was included in the Springer Economic Development Plan that the regional representative collaboratively drafted and assisted the Greater Springer EDC and the Village of Springer adopt through public meetings. **Outcome: New capital investment.**

Harding County Assisted Living Facility received funding through the federal Affordable Housing Act to purchase a building for renovation as a result of help from the regional representative. The facility is complete and advertising for a manager has been posted. **Outcome: New capital investment.**

El Morro Valley Cooperative & Commercial Kitchen received a \$13,000 grant from NMEDD to support business workshops and trainings, as well as assist in paying for a kitchen manager. **Outcome: New jobs and revenue.**

Los Pueblos Kitchen in Ribera also received a kitchen grant of \$13,000 thanks to the work of the regional representative in completing an application and creating a menu of assistance for kitchen businesses. **Outcome: New jobs and revenue.**

Local Economic Assistance & Development Support Program (LEADS)

Two years ago EDD transitioned the Certified Communities Initiative in order to support specific projects that have a direct, immediate impact on the community or region. \$165,200 was distributed to 14 rural communities through a competitive application process.

Office of International Trade (OIT)

The NM Economic Development Department, Office of International Trade was awarded a State Trade Export Promotion Grant by the U.S. Small Business Administration for the third consecutive year since the inception of the program. The funding is to assist NM companies by paying for booth space at major international trade shows and Gold Key Service matchmaking programs administered by the U.S. Department of Commerce through its network of overseas trade offices. The SBA award for the current fiscal year was in the amount of \$193,700 and has assisted over 40 New Mexico companies to market their products abroad.

New Mexico exports to Mexico increased for a fourth consecutive year to a record \$1.7 billion accounting for roughly 40% of total NM overseas exports of \$3.8 billion. The most recently available statistics show that NM has registered a four-fold increase in exports to Mexico since 2011. Improvements in infrastructure and border facilities in Santa Teresa-San Jeronimo has greatly facilitated the movement of goods and channeled exports through the port. Planned infrastructure improvements promise to further stimulate exports of NM goods and services to Mexico.

Exports of non-traditional NM goods was facilitated by companies participating in the Shot Show in Las Vegas, Nevada and the IWA Outdoor Show in Nuremberg, Germany. New Mexico companies were able to participate and showcase their unique outdoor products with assistance under the New Mexico SBA STEP Grant program.

A record number of six NM technology companies participated in the Hannover Messe event in Hannover, Germany in April 2016 to display their innovative range of products to one of the largest high technology venues in the world. Hannover Messe yearly attracts over 100,000 industry visitors looking to find distribution partners and purveyors of high technology products and services.



Office of Science and Technology (OST)

In FY16 OST enjoyed three major successes, launching the Catalyst Fund, winning a DOD grant, and funding six technology collaborations through the Technology Research Collaborative.

Catalyst Fund

The Office of Science & Technology was instrumental in reallocating the US Treasury State Small Business Credit Initiative's \$5 million in funding to establish the New Mexico Catalyst Fund, which will then leverage an additional \$20 million in matching funds additional seed capital. The Fund provides seed and early stage capital to New Mexico's technology startups. The fund consists of \$20 million that will be matched by private investment. In the total the fund may potentially exceed \$40 million. The Catalyst Fund fills a much needed funding gap in the state and strengthens New Mexico's entrepreneurial ecosystem.

Department of Defense (DOD) Grant

OST won and implemented a \$1.6 million grant to assist communities, business, and workers that may be affected by reductions in Department of Defense spending. Assistance for at risk DOD suppliers will include workforce training and certification, marketing and sales consultation, new market opportunities, and technology maturation. As part of this effort, a permanent New Mexico-focused web portal will be established to serve as the critical conduit for sharing information, leveraging in-state assets, and strategic partnering during the study term and into the future. This grant decreases reliance on federal spending for New Mexico's defense contractors and diversifies and strengthens New Mexico's economy.

Technology Research Collaborative (TRC)

The TRC is operational, and has funded six collaborations (with the \$300,000 FY16 appropriation) involving a university, federal laboratory and businesses, leveraging \$1.6 million in private funds. Specifically, the TRC funding will assist three photonics technologies out of the UNM Center for High Tech Materials and Engineering; two bioscience technologies, including one sensor technology project with UNM Health Sciences Center and one bio-agriculture technology with NMSU; and one oil/water technology from New Mexico Tech which will boost the capability for

produced water purification. On March 14th Governor Susanna Martinez announced the award:

• The University of New Mexico will collaborate with Sandia National Laboratories and Dynamic Photonics through a \$60,000 award to develop a significantly cheaper way to produce optical receivers which are used in laser-based fiber optic communications.

• With a \$62,000 award, UNM will collaborate with the Air Force Research Laboratory, and others.

• With \$40,000, UNM will collaborate with the Center for Integrated Nanotechnologies and OptiPulse,Inc. to commercialize new approaches to growing and expanding wireless broadband.

• Through a \$50,000 award, UNM will work with Pressure Analysis Corporation and Albuquerque's Duke City Gladiators to develop football helmets designed to lower the risk of head injuries.

• With \$50,000, New Mexico State University will collaborate with NMX Organic Pesticides

• New Mexico Tech and Los Alamos National Laboratory will use a \$38,000 award to develop arsenic removal technology to purify water used in the oil and gas industry.

NEW MEXICO FILM OFFICE

The Film Office continues its focus on three main initiatives:

- (1) Recruitment: Emerging Media & Production;
- (2) Workforce Development; and
- (3) Statewide Outreach.

Recruitment:

The film office's primary purpose is to market the state to the film & television and emerging media industries, service the recruited productions and companies, and promote job and business opportunities for New Mexico residents. This includes consulting with production and emerging media companies regarding the financial aspects of their projects, and guiding them through the incentives such as the Refundable Film Production Tax Credit. The NMFO also provides direction to companies regarding potential locations on which to film, as well as connecting the productions with the crew, vendor services and film liaisons throughout the state. The office also continues to work towards taking the lead in Emerging Media entrepreneurial opportunities in-state.

Highlights:

• The NMFO currently has six (6) features and six (6) television series in production at the end of Q4 2016: Films: Granite Mountain, Hostiles, An Ideal Home, Logan, Cowboy Drifter and I am That. TV series: Midnight, Texas (NBC pilot), Longmire Season 5 (Netflix), Preacher Season 1 (AMC), From Dusk Till Dawn Season 3 (El Rey/Netflix), The Night Shift Season 3 (NBC) and Godless Season 1 (Netflix).



• The NMFO also anticipates Q1 FY17 to include the continuation of production of three (3) major studio features (over \$100+ M), many potential mid-range independent features (\$1-\$20M per) as well as a NBC mini-series and the return of the critically acclaimed *Better Call Saul Season 3* this July.

• *Midnight, Texas* was greenlit by NBC for a ten (10) episode series order to begin shooting this fall.

• The Film Office announced a strategic partnership with Panda iMedia, one of China's top online media holding companies which specializes in the production of digital content and online promotion for China's top 500 enterprises. A cross cultural training event with over 35 of China's top members took place in June.

• NMFO is currently working on systems updates (websites, forms, workflow streamlining and standardizing protocol) for the refundable film production tax credit processes.

Workforce Development

The Job Training Incentive Program for Film & Multimedia (JTIP) provides multiple ways for residents to advance in this industry and to keep talent in-state. The program continues to evolve and expand to meet industry needs. The Film Crew Advancement Program (FCAP) is the office's priority program in training as it provides job opportunities with a production where crew diversifies their skill sets increasing continual employment in the industry. As an additional incentive to the film tax credit, productions that hire qualifying, local crew are reimbursed fifty percent of a qualifying resident's wages for up to 1040 hours.

• 1st Quarter: Eight (8) companies qualified for FCAP with eighty-four (84) resident participants. In addition to JTIP, approximately twenty-five (25) residents participated in on-set lectures, conducted during production as part of a "give-back" program for participation in the Refundable Film Production Tax Credit.

• 2nd Quarter: Two (2) companies qualified for FCAP with fourteen (14) resident participants.



• 3rd Quarter: Six (6) companies qualified for FCAP with fifty-nine (59) resident participants.

• 4th Quarter: Four (4) companies qualified for FCAP with fifty-four (54) resident participants.

Statewide Outreach

There are a variety of ways the NMFO works with local communities, schools, filmmakers and chambers in order to assist and promote the industry and the jobs it creates. In FY16, the film office welcomed a new member to their team as the Outreach Coordinator to spearhead these efforts.

Highlights


In the first quarter, the NMFO hosted a screening of *The Scorch Trials*, presented by Fox Studios, which had over 200 attendees. The 2015 NM Filmmakers

Showcase submissions were screened at the Dark Frame Film Festival in Albuquerque. Additionally, NMFO continued to elevate the office social and informational outreach efforts through the NMFO's website, Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, Constant Contact and bi-monthly newsletter.

In the second quarter, the NMFO's annual NM Film & Media Industry Conference took place at the Isleta Casino & Resort, providing a variety of compelling topics with an array of guest speakers and panelist, and over 400 registrants, a 26% increase as compared to 2014. In December, the NMFO also participated in the ESPN's NM Bowl at UNM. This quarter also saw the continuation of the NMFO Internship program. The on-going program is designed to allow students the opportunity to have exposure to the workings of the NMFO and the industry. Ten students have successfully cycled through the internship program this year.

In the third quarter, the NMFO held a Las Cruces town hall with over 80 participants discussing the state of the film industry and opportunities available to Las Cruces and New Mexico residents in the film and television industry. Additionally NMFO began working with the State-wide Film Liaison Network to update their city endorsements.

In the fourth guarter, the NMFO hosted the annual Film and Media Educational Summit at CNM in Albuquerque. Cabinet Secretary of New Mexico Higher Education Dr. Barbara Damron gave a keynote address highlighting Governor Martinez's vision of creating a more cohesive higher education system. The event was hosted over 70 educators, industry professionals and students. Additionally, the NMFO hosted private cast and crew screenings of Batman vs. Superman and Independence Day Resurgence with over 200 attendees at each screening. The State Outreach Coordinator traveled to Alamogordo, NM to act as Keynote Speaker for the Desert Lights Film Festival. The festival celebrates the achievements of young filmmakers and boasted an attendance of over 400 students.
