NMEDD 4th Quarter Performance Report

Mission: Enhance and leverage a competitive environment to create jobs, develop the tax base and provide incentives for business development.

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OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

On the last day of the fiscal year Governor Susana Martinez and Secretary Barela gathered in Rio Rancho to announce the expansion of **Safelite AutoGlass** into New Mexico, creating 900 new jobs. Safelite is the world's largest vehicle glass repair and replacement company with 13,000 employees nationwide.

The state will invest \$3 million in LEDA funding and the company will take advantage of the new Rapid Workforce Development Fund which was created as a priority of Governor Martinez in the 2016 legislative session. Safelite will use the Workforce Fund to teach its employees Spanish speaking skills.

This announcement represents the single largest project, in terms of job creation, since 2009.

Other announcements during the 4th quarter included –

- Mako Medical Laboratories, 100 jobs in Albuquerque
- Wildflower International expanding in Santa Fe, 81 jobs
- Pecan Brewery in Las Cruces, 40 jobs
- Federal Express logistics center in Santa Teresa, 200 jobs
- PCM Sales, a California information technology company, 224 jobs in Rio Rancho
- W Silver Rail Spur, 4 jobs in Santa Teresa

In 2015 the Film Office set a new record, reporting \$288 million in direct spending by production companies during the year. In FY16 Film shattered that record by nearly \$1 million, with \$387 million in total direct spending. This represents 63 productions and nearly 260,000 worker days. Thirty of these productions spent more than \$1 million.

Because of the duration of filming, television productions typically generate the most revenue. TV series and pilots filmed in New Mexico during FY16 included *Better Call Saul; Preacher; From Dusk Till Dawn; The Night Shift; Midnight, Texas; Longmire; Manhattan; Untitled Mars Project;* and *Graves*.

Feature film productions shot during the year included GOLD; 2 Years and 8 Days; "t@gged;" The Space Between Us; EDGE; The Magnificent Seven; and Granite Mountain.

Office of Business Advocacy (OBA)

OBA opened and closed four cases during the 4th quarter. Cases were resolved for these companies:

Rural Commercial Kitchen Initiative

The second annual Kitchen Summit was held in April at the South Valley Economic Development Center. Fourteen community or kitchen representatives attended the two-day event.

Five kitchens were supported with grants in FY16. Two of the kitchens, the Taos Food Center and South Valley, served as mentors to communities considering a kitchen facility and new rural kitchens just getting started. These two kitchens received \$15,500 each for operating their facilities and training or mentoring others. The new startup kitchens are in Espanola, Ribera and El Morro and they received \$13,000 each. In addition, South Valley is working with Las Cruces, Santa Fe and downtown Albuquerque on potential kitchen projects.

New Mexico Partnership (NMP)

The Partnership finished FY16 with ten projects closed and a total of 1,579 jobs.

New Mexico MainStreet (NMMS)

4th Quarter Highlights:

In downtown Artesia, Talen LPE Consultants completed a new roof project on their building (\$17,900), as did the Dunn Funeral Home in Tucumcari's MainStreet district (\$42,000).

Corrales' Casa Vieja is coming back with a major renovation. So far, private reinvestment on that project totals \$230,000.

Six private interior and exterior paint, repair, signage and refurbishment projects in the Lovington MainStreet district this quarter totaled \$37,850.



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Finance Development Team

Twenty-three LEDA projects closed in FY16, totaling \$15.2 million. This amount was leveraged against total private investment in these projects of \$256.8 million, for a final ratio of 16.8 to 1. Eleven of these projects are in rural communities: Alamogordo, Clovis, Corrales, Jal, Portales, Roswell, Pena Blanca, Santa Teresa (2), Silver City, Socorro, and Tucumcari.

The Finance Development Team also provided technical assistance to three companies resulting in new funding for both:

- 1. **Taos Mesa Brewing**: FDT worked with the company over the previous year to improve and focus its financial position. FDT worked with the private equity firm Luna Capital to secure bridge financing that ultimately resulted in a commercial loan from a Delaware bank.
- 2. **Gallup Pipeline & Compliance Services, LLC**: FDT staff worked with the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) through the Collateral Support Program to assist the company with a bank participation loan through Pinnacle Bank & NMFA.
- 3. **Carnivores Meat Processing, Chama**: Owner is a multi-generational butcher, he wants to carry on the tradition and start his own meat processing shop to cater to the hunters of Northern New Mexico. He is purchasing a building compound and equipment to start the business. He has over 15 years' experience in the meat-processing industry.

Community, Business & Rural Development Team

There were 14 successful business development projects completed in FY16.

Region 2

- **Plectone** is a manufacturer of guitar picks located in Albuquerque. The company was seeking international exposure and new markets. The Team member explained the services provided by EDD's Office of International Trade. Plectone received new orders from companies in Israel and Mexico in August resulting in increased revenue.
- Taos Herb Company manufactures herbal products and was looking for programs to facilitate business growth. The Team member introduced the company to the Job Training Incentive Program and New Mexico tax credits they may be able to take advantage of. This resulted in the company receiving JTIP assistance at the August meeting and the creation of two new jobs.

Region 4

- Old Wood, Las Vegas, is a manufacturer of wood flooring. The Team member organized
 meetings with USDA Rural Development which resulted in the company receiving a \$300,000
 Value Added Producers Grant. Old Wood invested in new equipment that will add a product
 line for the company, resulting in new sales through Walmart.
- Energy Concepts Corporation, located in Sapello, installs solar systems and was seeking
 assistance to expand its workforce. The Team member introduced the company to JTIP
 resulting in funding for three new positions.
- Denny's Restaurant, Las Vegas, chose the city for a new location after the regional representative contacted the corporate headquarters. Land has been secured and the new building will be funded by Denny's Corporation.
- Doss Aviation, Raton, chose Raton as a result of the regional representative working with the
 New Mexico National Guard to transfer a vacant armory to the City of Raton which the city used
 to recruit the company. Doss will train Department of Defense student pilots and plans to hire
 five new training pilot instructors. This will result in the expansion into international student
 markets. The regional representative is continuing to work with Doss Aviation on short term
 student housing to accommodate up to 20 student pilots through local partners including the
 City of Raton and Grow Raton.
- Tucumcari Biofuels Corporation is a start-up which will convert the former ethanol plant into a grain storage and methane gas production facility. The regional representative assisted with getting the investors in touch with the owners of the former ethanol plant to identify potential grain storage users. Funding has been secured through a \$70,000 purchase agreement with Los Alamos Bank. A Phase One environmental assessment has been completed. Arrowhead Center completed a feasibility study and owns 2 percent of the company.
- Medicus Billing and Consulting, Inc., Las Vegas, expanded to the city to increase New Mexico
 medical billing of physician practices. They will hire up to 15 employees at an average hourly
 wage of \$14.00. The company has purchased a building and anticipates utilizing JTIP.
- Mora Woodworking was assisted in developing a business plan and received direction for a
 patent and prototype design. As a result of this assistance the company has been able to secure
 \$93,500 in funding including a \$30,000 Venture Accelerator Award.

Region 5

- Ready Roast purchased the peanut processing plant in Portales and needed assistance with
 permitting, incentives and employee training. The Team member connected the company to
 OBA and all issues regarding an air quality permit were satisfactorily resolved. He also
 introduced the company to JTIP and they were approved for 30 new positions in September.
 Governor Martinez announced a LEDA commitment of \$1.5 million on September 21st.
- RichGlo, Roswell, is a jewelry cleaner manufacturer that has been in business for 20 years and
 has acquired property for a new manufacturing facility. The regional representative assisted
 the company in developing the plant layout, pro forma and business plan for a successful LEDA
 application.

Region 6

- Samson Equipment is an equipment manufacturer in the City of Las Cruces. The city has a Wage Plus program that augments JTIP funding and the Team member assisted City staff in developing a process for making payment to a business and helped the company by collecting the JTIP documentation they needed to submit an application. Once the application was submitted the rep worked with the City's economic development office to complete the process. Samson Equipment was awarded \$1,500.00 to offset costs associated with creation of the new Plant Manager position.
- Silicon Mesa, a software development company, has been operating from the Arrowhead Center at NMSU for over a year but was not aware of the Rural Software Development GRT deduction. The regional representative provided the company with information about the deduction and how to claim it. When the company's accountant submitted CRS information to the Taxation and Revenue Department (TRD) they received inadequate and incorrect information. The rep spoke with the TRD auditor and audit supervisor on behalf of the company to resolve TRD concerns and get more complete information for the company. Silicon Mesa was able to deduct revenue from software development from their taxes for prior periods and moving forward which will help the startup company to be more profitable and competitive.
- Valley Cold Storage is a produce storage and distribution facility in Santa Teresa. The company is expanding by constructing a second facility in Dona Ana County. They were awarded LEDA based on job creation but also needed an Industrial Revenue Bond as part of their financing plan. County was unable to induce the IRB but I was able to work with the leadership in City of Anthony which agreed to assist with the project. Team member provided City staff and elected officials with information about IRBs and assisted the City and the businesses through the process including explaining the incentive and benefits at each public hearing and working with City staff to set up accounting process. Valley Cold Storage has been approved for tax incentives for up to \$40,000,000 in investment through the IRB.

Seven economic development projects were completed in FY16:

<u>Sandoval County Innovation Center</u> was funded in part by a \$15,000 NMEDD LEADS grant. The Center is now fully operational with 8 interns actively engaged in entrepreneurial projects. The Center encourages high school and college-aged students to participate in entrepreneurial activities such as designing web pages, creating phone apps and computer programs that can be utilized by local business and other businesses worldwide. The concept has been embraced by Intel who has provided free space to house the center. The regional representative helped with the initial application and has been involved in the

planning throughout the various stages of the project. The Center has already created a web design business, has successfully created apps which are being utilized by local businesses and are working on more. **Outcome: New business, revenue and jobs**

<u>Guadalupe County purchased the Pecos Theatre</u> in January 2016 for \$55,000. The regional representative assisted the business owner and Guadalupe County in facilitating the first site visit as well as participated and facilitated further discussions that ultimately led to this new theatre investment. The theater and a new barber shop are creating an entrepreneurial anchor in the heart of downtown. The regional representative also drafted and presented the proposed LEDA **Outcome: New capital investment**

Anton Chico Land Grant Economic Development Incubator Mainstreet Frontier Project was selected and has received \$75,000 in grants and services. The Regional Representative assisted the board in registering the corporation. In addition he assisted with the management strategy with the Land Grant Board, which is the landlord. The Singleton Ranch provided the matching funds, which was the largest match received to-date. The regional representative shared presentations at a town hall event as well as organized a business resource fair for potential commercial kitchen and rental tenants. The incubator is currently advertising to hire a manager and the Incubator intends to by fully operational by next quarter. **Outcome: New jobs, businesses and revenue**

<u>Greater Springer Economic Development Corporation</u> has purchased the Sapp-designed commercial building for \$15,000. The Economic Development Corporation plans to make the property suitable for resale to a commercial business that will serve the drive through traffic from Texas, thus increasing revenue for the village. This project was included in the FY16 Frontier Program and will be rehabilitated to house retail growth. This building was included in the Springer Economic Development Plan that the regional representative collaboratively drafted and assisted the Greater Springer EDC and the Village of Springer adopt through public meetings. **Outcome: New capital investment**

<u>Harding County Assisted Living Facility</u> received funding through the federal Affordable Housing Act to purchase a building for renovation as a result of help from the regional representative. The facility is complete and advertising for a manager has been posted. **Outcome: New capital investment**

El Morro Valley Cooperative & Commercial Kitchen project could not move forward due to issues with Construction Industries and the Secretary of State's Office. The regional representative worked with the Office of Business Advocacy to resolve these issues. The result of these efforts is a \$13,000 grant from NMEDD to support business workshops and trainings, as well as assist in paying for a kitchen manager. **Outcome: New jobs and revenue**

<u>Los Pueblos Kitchen</u> in Ribera also received a kitchen grant of \$13,000 thanks to the work of the Team Member in completing an application and creating a menu of assistance for kitchen businesses.

Outcome: New jobs and revenue

Job Training Incentive Program (JTIP)

JTIP has had another year of successfully serving both new and existing businesses, including some exciting technology startups. Sixty companies benefited, eight of which are rural, for a total of \$13.4 million obligated. A total of 2,238 workers were trained, with 11 Step-Up trainees and 20 internships funded.

New Mexico Film Office (NMFO)

The Film Office continues its focus on three main initiatives: (1) Recruitment: Emerging Media & Production; (2) Workforce Development; and (3) Statewide Outreach.

Recruitment:

The film office's primary purpose is to market the state to the film & television and emerging media industries, service the recruited productions and companies, and promote job and business opportunities for New Mexico residents. This includes consulting with production and emerging media companies regarding the financial aspects of their projects, and guiding them through the incentives such as the Refundable Film Production Tax Credit. The NMFO also provides direction to companies regarding potential locations on which to film, as well as connecting the productions with the crew, vendor services and film liaisons throughout the state. The office also continues to work towards taking the lead in Emerging Media entrepreneurial opportunities in-state.

Highlights:

- The NMFO currently has six (6) features and six (6) television series in production at the end of Q4 2016: Films: Granite Mountain, Hostiles, An Ideal Home, Juarez, Cowboy Drifter and I am That. TV series: Midnight, Texas (NBC pilot), Longmire Season 5 (Netflix), Preacher Season 1 (AMC), From Dusk Till Dawn Season 3 (El Rey/Netflix), The Night Shift Season 3 (NBC) and Godless Season 1 (Netflix).
- The NMFO also anticipates Q1 FY17 to include the continuation of production of three (3) major studio features (over \$100+ M), many potential mid-range independent features (\$1-\$20M per) as well as a NBC mini-series and the return of the critically acclaimed *Better Call Saul* Season 3 this July. Currently NMFO has active communication with over fifteen (15) potential western genre film projects that could shoot until December 2016.
- Midnight, Texas was greenlit by NBC for a ten (10) episode series order to begin shooting this fall and Preacher Season 2 was greenlit by AMC to begin shooting.
- NMFO is waiting for confirmation of the return of Night Shift Season 4 and Longmire Season 6.
- ➤ Having the extra 5% for TV series has proved to draw TV networks to NM.
- > The Film Office announced a strategic partnership with Panda iMedia, one of China's top online media holding companies which specializes in the production of digital content and online promotion for China's top 500 enterprises. A cross cultural training event with over 35 of China's top members took place in June.
- NMFO is currently working on systems updates (websites, forms, workflow streamlining and standardizing protocol) for the refundable film production tax credit processes.

Workforce Development:

The Job Training Incentive Program for Film & Multimedia (JTIP) provides multiple ways for residents to advance in this industry and to keep talent in-state. The program continues to evolve and expand to meet industry needs. The Film Crew Advancement Program (FCAP) is the office's priority program in training as it provides job opportunities with a production where crew diversifies their skill sets increasing continual employment in the industry. As an additional incentive to the film tax credit, productions that hire qualifying, local crew are reimbursed fifty percent of a qualifying resident's wages for up to 1040 hours.

- During the first quarter, eight (8) companies qualified for FCAP with eighty-four (84) resident participants. In addition to JTIP, approximately twenty-five (25) residents participated in on-set lectures, conducted during production as part of a "give-back" program for participation in the Refundable Film Production Tax Credit.
- During the second quarter, two (2) companies qualified for FCAP with fourteen (14) resident participants.
- During the third quarter, six (6) companies qualified for FCAP with fifty-nine (59) resident participants.
- > During the fourth quarter, four (4) companies qualified for FCAP with fifty-four (54) resident participants.

Statewide Outreach:

There are a variety of ways the NMFO works with local communities, schools, filmmakers and chambers in order to assist and promote the industry and the jobs it creates. In FY16, the film office welcomed a new member to their team as the Outreach Coordinator to spearhead these efforts.

Highlights:

- In the first quarter, the NMFO hosted a screening of *The Scorch Trials*, presented by Fox Studios, which had over 200 attendees; and, the 2015 NM Filmmakers Showcase submissions were screened at the Dark Frame Film Festival in Albuquerque. Additionally, the Outreach Coordinator continued to elevate the NMFO's social and informational outreach efforts by managing the NMFO's website, Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, Constant Contact and bi-monthly newsletter. Continuing the trend of communicating the NMFO's mission, Outreach continues to host *New Mexico Film Works*, a live weekly one-hour radio talk show where industry professionals share their wisdom and experiences in the film industry both in New Mexico and around the globe.
- In the second quarter, the NMFO's annual NM Film & Media Industry Conference took place at the Isleta Casino & Resort, providing a variety of compelling topics with an extraordinary array of forty in and out-of-state guest speakers and panelist, and over 400 registrants, a 26% increase as compared to 2014. In December, the NMFO also participated in the ESPN's NM Bowl at UNM which included the debut screening of the New Mexico Sizzle Reel, a high energy promo highlighting productions shot in NM. The NMFO also had a celebrity guest appearance from Elise Eberle, New Mexico actor and star of the hit show *Salem*. The NM Bowl audience exceeded 50,000 attendees. This quarter also saw the revival of the NMFO Internship program. The on-going program is designed to allow freshman filmmakers the opportunity to have exposure to the inner workings of the NMFO as well as giving them exposure to the 25-30% film tax incentive program. Since the re-introduction of the program, ten students have successfully cycled through the internship program.
- In the third quarter, the NMFO held a Las Cruces town hall with over 80 participants discussing the state of the film industry and opportunities available to New Mexico residents in the film and television industry. Additionally Outreach began working with the State-wide Film Liaison Network to update their

- city endorsements. This network of over 40 liaisons is often the first point of contact for incoming film productions.
- In the fourth quarter, the NMFO hosted the annual Film and Media Educational Summit at CNM in Albuquerque. Cabinet Secretary of New Mexico Higher Education Dr. Barbara Damron gave a high energy and informational keynote address where she highlighted Governor Martinez's vision of creating a more cohesive higher education system. The event was hosted to over 70 educators, industry professionals and students. From this event, the NMFO created a one-minute promotional video, highlighting the panels. Additionally, the NMFO hosted private cast and crew screenings of Batman vs. Superman and Independence Day Resurgence with over 200 attendees at each screening. The State Outreach Coordinator, traveled to Alamogordo, NM to act as Keynote Speaker for the Desert Lights Film Festival. The festival celebrates the achievements of young filmmakers and boasted an attendance of over 400 students.

Emerging Media and Technologies

- Worked with local NM Company to develop a NM State Film Office (NMFO) App. The App will allow users to stream video and provide information about NMFO.
- Updated definitions and language specific to Digital Media for the New Mexico Economic Development Department and Film Division.
- Moderated an emerging media panel during the annual NMFO Education Summit.
- Facilitated cross-cultural strategic partnership and training event with Beijing-based Panda iMedia. The NMFO and Panda iMedia are working on showcase events in October 2016 and March 2017.
- Met with 3 Latin American tech companies who will potentially move to New Mexico: Technalia of Spain, EPM of Colombia and Ruta-N of Medellin. Also made alignments with key tech partners in the State of Antioquia who wish to do business in and/or with New Mexico. This venture looks to create approximately 40 jobs and \$40M-\$60M revenue by year end 2017.
