I. Summary of Outcomes to Date

As a result of the funding through the State of New Mexico and the Economic Development Department "EDD", the Pueblo of Santa Ana has been able to provide materials, food, gift cards, training and travel and scholarships to many Santa Ana Tribal Members as well as employees.

The Santa Ana Department of Education Library has had the ability to purchase items for the Hiking Program including food and gift cards for hiking materials for participants in the Hiking Program.

Four Enrolled Santa Ana Tribal Members have benefited from continuing education scholarships for tuition, enrichment and other college associated needs. This allowed for tuition payments to be made in full, housing allotments, personal costs such as books and supplies to be purchased and enrichment activities to be paid for through the EDD Grant.

Three Santa Ana Employees were able to attend the Falmouth Institute training for the Tribal Administrative Professionals Conference. This three day intensive conference gave three individuals the opportunity to learn and develop their knowledge to better support the Pueblo of Santa Ana in the departments of Education, Early Childhood and Wellness. All three programs support the learning of individuals from Birth through Career and the wellness and fitness of Santa Ana.

Additionally, accommodations for hotels and travel were supported for many SADE employees because of the EDD Grant.

II. Location of the Project

This project has taken place on the Pueblo of Santa Ana, New Mexico. Trainings took place in Las Vegas Nevada. Scholarships were provided to Central New Mexico, Arizona State University, Seabrook, TX and Brookline College, New Mexico.

III. Potential for Job Creation

There were not positions created because of Economic Development Grant, however, it is the hope that the scholarships and supplemental education will bring those in creative industries to seek employment with the Pueblo of Santa Ana upon completion of their field of study.

IV. Explanation of the Community, Stakeholder, and Industry Participation

There were scholarships offered to four individuals through this grant. All fields of study will greatly benefit the Pueblo of Santa Ana in the future. Fields of study include Electrical, Nursing Aide, Architecture, and Nursing. All fields would have potential to benefit the Pueblo of Santa Ana in the future through departments such as Public Works, Health Services and Building and Housing.

The benefits to the four scholarship recipients will also benefit as all four will leave their college career and have the ability to enter in to competitive positions and have compensation that would support them and their families in years to come.

V. Overall Economic Contributions


The use of funding for the Creative Industries Economic Development Grant was divided over use for the Hiking Program at the Library totaling \$545.43. Scholarship funding was \$53500.91 to support students in an architecture program, nursing program, nursing assistant program and electrician program. \$4731.25 was utilized for travel for staff members to attend training and \$2880 was used for training for staff members.

I currently attend classes geared towards an Associates Degree in Photovoltaic Electrician field.

Since I have obtained the scholarship, it has helped out tremendously because the price of tuition along with books and lab fees have gone up, and also the cost of everything else.

This scholarship has allowed me to concentrate fully on my schooling with minimal commitment to a full time employment. With that said, I currently have a GPA of 3.57 and have been recommended to the Deans list after completing my sophomore year.

It has also allowed me time to pursue other training in the field that would otherwise be used working. The training is on the administrative side as it is focused on Grant writing and management of Tribal solar projects and training of community members to work on existing Solar infrastructure and to help implement future Solar or renewable project initiatives.

I am sincerely thank this Scholarship for providing financial assistance in my quest to get educated and trained in the Photovoltaic industry in hopes of getting my Tribal community energy independent in the near future.
