

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

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# Local Economic Assistance & Development Support LEADS



The grants provided through LEADS are intended to create wealth in New Mexico

Grants range from \$5,000 to \$25,000.

#### Program Objectives:

- Recruitment, retention and expansion, or creation of jobs
- Development of tax base
- Business Development





#### Entities that may apply\*:

- Economic development effort that includes both public and private participation
- Have an up-to-date community economic development plan and a marketing plan
- Located within Communities that adopted the Local Economic Development Act (LEDA), and, ideally, a Local Option Gross Receipts Tax (LOGRT)

<sup>\*</sup>Must be determined eligible by leadership and local reps





#### Organizational Status of applicant:

- Incorporated municipalities and counties, to include Native American tribal entities
- Must have physical presence, operates, and is incorporated under the New Mexico not-for-profit corporation law,
  - (i.e., Economic Development Organization, Chamber of Commerce, workforce organization, or business association.)
- All applicants must be auditable and eligible to receive state funding.

# LEADS Eligibility Requirements



#### Eligible Projects:

- Support job creation, expansion of tax base, and/or business development.
- Are consistent economic development plan.
- Have a clear beginning and end.
- Have an appropriate budget and timeline.
- Must address at least one of the following core economic development areas:
  - Business Retention/Expansion
  - Real Estate
  - Technology and Entrepreneurial Development
  - Workforce Development
  - NEW Regional Strategic Planning Efforts

# Examples of Eligible Projects



- Business Retention & Expansion
  - Outreach to existing businesses to identify and support growth opportunities
  - Assist with expansions (e.g. new products, increased capacity) to retain jobs and grow the tax base
- Real Estate Development
  - Develop or improve industrial parks to attract new businesses
  - Renovate publicly owned or non-profit-owned buildings for commercial use
- Technology & Entrepreneurial Development
  - Create or expand business incubators and accelerators
  - Support tech start-ups and innovation-driven companies
  - Establish shared/co-working spaces for small businesses and freelancers

# Examples of Eligible Projects



- Workforce Development
  - Launch or support job training and skill enhancement programs
  - Help businesses upskill their workforce
  - Develop apprenticeship programs in high-demand industries
- Regional Economic Development
  - Support regional strategic planning to improve competitiveness
  - Promote collaboration among cities, counties, and EDOs to align economic development efforts

# Ineligible Costs



- Printed collateral materials
- Website development or maintenance
- Professional development
- Advertising
- Tradeshows
- Sales missions and related expenses





#### Schedule a pre-application consultation

 Connect with your Regional Representative to review project ideas and confirm eligibility.

#### Confirm eligibility

 Once eligibility of both the organization and project is determined, your Regional Rep will provide detailed instructions for submitting your application.

#### Submit your online application

Complete and submit the application through the LEADS portal by 5:00 PM (MT) on Friday, May 5, 2025.

#### Submit presentation materials

Send your PowerPoint presentation (for the virtual project pitch) to your Regional Rep by May 19, 2025.





- Presentation Dates:
  - Attend a virtual presentation on May 20–21, 2025
  - Present your proposed project and grant request to the review committee
- Presentation Format:30-minute total session
  - Up to 10 minutes for PowerPoint presentation
  - Remaining time for Q&A with the committee
- Recommended Presentation Components:
  - Organization Background
  - Overall Project Budget
  - LEADS Grant Budget
  - Scope of Work (key activities, timeline, and expected outcomes)





- Competitive Application Process
  - Applications are reviewed by NM Economic Development Department (EDD) staff and the Small Business Development Center (SBDC)
- Final award decisions are made by the NM EDD Office of the Secretary
- Funding is provided through a cost reimbursement grant agreement
- The grant period begins July 1, 2025, or on the date the grant agreement is signed, and ends June 30, 2026
- All approved project activities must be completed by June 30, 2026
- Final invoices and project reports must be submitted to NM EDD by the end of the grant period





- The number of projects that may receive LEADS funding will vary based on the availability of funds
- Funding recommendations will be submitted to the Office of the Secretary
- June 2025 notices of award or denial and grant agreements will be sent out via the Regional Reps

### LEADS FY25 Awardees



- Awarded projects must be completed final invoices and end of year reports due by JUNE 2025
- End of year reports will be submitted via the portal.
  - Reps will be sending out instructions
- Make sure to reach out to reps regarding FY25 LEADS
  - Ensure stay in good standing with NM EDD

# 2022-2023 LEADS CYCLE ADVANCED MANUFACTURING STUDY

#### **STUDY OBJECTIVES**

- Analyze emerging advanced manufacturing roles of future
- Quantify existing advanced manufacturing workforce
- Quantify existing educational pathways & pipeline supporting advanced manufacturing





#### STUDY FINDINGS

- Existing Skill Set: 569k industrial workforce, 27k Advanced Manufacturing Workforce, 11k Advanced Manufacturing Student Pipeline
- In Demand Roles: Advanced Machine Operator, Automation Technician, Logistician, Manufacturing Process Technician
- Core Skill Sets: Operations, Communication, Problem Solving, Computer Basics, Teamwork & Collaboration
- **Recommendation:** Promote existing industry certifications as one strategy to grow advanced manufacturing talent pool within the Borderplex region.



### 2023-2024 LEADS CYCLE AUTOMATE UP PILOT PROGRAM

"Promote existing industry certifications as one strategy to grow advanced manufacturing talent pool within the Borderplex region."



#### PLANNING AND PATHWAY

- Identify Companies currently advancing manufacturing skill sets (and signals for advancement)
- Match identified "in-demand" industry certifications and Advanced Manufacturing Industry Certifications and administrators.
- Identify roadblocks and methods to meet employers needs lead to focusing on micro-certifications.
- Exhauste LEADS \$25k funding by May of 2024



### 2024-2025 LEADS CYCLE AUTOMATE UP +

Program Expansion
With additional funding program growth included expansion to new industries, and workforce pipeline.



#### NEXT STEPS

- Expand Industry Sectors: Computer Technology, Value Added-Ag, Aerospace, Digital Media, Bioscience & Medicine, New Mexico Economic Development Department LEADS Grant
- Expand Reach and Impact: Existing Workforce, Student Pipeline, Individuals
- Sustain Program Funding: LEADS Grant \$25k, City of Las Cruces ARPA \$50K, EPE Charitable Grant \$25k



# Gateway Park



#### Gateway Park Phase 1 Budget

**\$1-\$1.2 million:** Phase 1 - utilities, pavilion, landscape and parking area.

\$300k grant: ONRT Gold King Mine Settlement Fund.

\$700-900k: Community Transformation and Economic

Diversification (CTED) fund.

**\$12,000 LEADS Grant:** for the internet system will be in addition to the total project cost.





## Timeline Issues












- Delays in approval of final designs, building placement and construction documents
- As my internet project was dependent on the construction of the building, project was not going to finish in time for FY 2023
- A keynote event being held on the site of construction also delayed the start date
- Eventually, supply chain issues and ongoing rising costs delayed it till the 2025 summer season
- Currently on track to complete the construction and installation of the internet service by the end of the 24-25 FY.

# Study Participation Criteria & Benefits



- Base Criteria for Participation:
  - Must provide contact information, site name, and site coordinates (Lat/Long)
  - Site must include a minimum of 50 developable acres
  - Intended for industrial use (zoned preferred but not required)
  - Willingness to participate in site visits, information sharing, and collaboration with contractors and partners
  - Must confirm if a letter of landowner support can be provided
- Benefits of Participation:
  - Participants receive full site evaluation documentation
  - Private property owners will be assessed a \$1,000 fee per site

# Study Scope & Evaluation Process



- Study Overview:
  - Locations selected by the Economic Development Department (EDD)
  - Evaluations conducted by a site readiness contractor
- Contractor Responsibilities:
  - Site Attribute Analysis:
    - Suitability for development
    - Best use determination based on zoning, transportation, utilities, and drainage plans
  - Infrastructure Assessment:
    - Evaluate water, wastewater, gas, electric, stormwater, and logistics
  - Identify Challenges:
    - Infrastructure gaps and needs
  - Deliverables:
    - Cost and development timeline estimates
    - Recommendations for highest and best use
    - Competitive analysis vs. neighboring states and similar sites





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
